The Michigan Department of Education (MDE) Office of Special Education (OSE) is part of the P-20 System and Student Transitions Division of MDE and is responsible for the general supervision, administration, and funding of special education programs and services for children and youth with disabilities ages 3 through 25. A free appropriate public education is provided to eligible children according to federal and state laws, regulations, administrative rules, and department procedures.

Inside the OSE

The OSE has several units to handle its general supervision responsibilities: Administration, Program Accountability, Program Finance, and Performance Reporting. The OSE is also responsible for the MDE Low Incidence Outreach program and the Michigan School for the Deaf. For general and contact information, see the Directory and Overview.

OSE Administration Unit

The Administration Unit provides leadership to and oversight of the office and ensures compliance with all federal and state statutory and regulatory requirements. The unit reports and responds to the State Board of Education, the State Superintendent, the Chief Deputy Superintendent, and the Deputy Superintendent.

OSE Program Accountability Unit

The Program Accountability Unit develops and implements special education policy. Policy is developed to align with—and clarify—federal and state requirements. The unit also administers the state and due process complaint processes.

OSE Program Finance Unit

The Program Finance Unit provides oversight for state aid and federal funding structures for special education programs and services. The unit ensures that federal grants and state aid reimbursements are effectively administered.

OSE Performance Reporting Unit

The Performance Reporting Unit coordinates the collection, verification, analysis, and reporting of special education student and personnel data for required federal and state reports. The unit also coordinates and provides technical assistance to districts and other stakeholder groups to ensure compliance with federal and state requirements and to improve outcomes for students with disabilities.

MDE Low Incidence Outreach

MDE Low Incidence Outreach (MDE-LIO) provides consultation, guidance, training, and resources to families and educational teams serving students who are Blind or Visually Impaired (BVI) and/or Deaf or Hard of Hearing (DHH).

MDE-LIO's vision is to ensure equal access to a quality education for all students who are BVI and/or DHH. Services include:

- Workshops and events for families and educators
- Braille, large print, and digital books for students
- American Printing House for the Blind (APH) Federal Quota products and textbooks
- Professional development materials and guides for educators

MDE-LIO also has direct oversight of <u>Camp Tuhsmeheta (Camp T)</u>, located in Greenville. Camp T is a 300-acre outdoor education facility that provides year-round programming for students with a visual impairment and others throughout the state of Michigan.

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The Michigan School for the Deaf (MSD) is a public residential school in Flint for students who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing (DHH) and was established by the Michigan Legislature in 1848. Students are referred to the school by their local school district and placement is determined by an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team. Students who attend the MSD receive a unique combination of services and intense exposure to two languages, American Sign Language (ASL) and English, as well as academic and residential support services.

Build Up Michigan

<u>Build Up Michigan</u> helps parents and their children, ages 3 through 5, get additional educational support as they begin and continue to learn the skills needed to enter kindergarten. Build Up Michigan partners with the MDE OSE to execute child find activities through targeted outreach efforts. Build Up Michigan supports Intermediate School Districts (ISDs) in Michigan in identifying young children for special education.

Build Up Michigan's goal is to refer all children who may be eligible for special education services through Michigan's Administrative Rules for Special Education and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act Part B.

Michigan Alliance for Families

The <u>Michigan Alliance for Families</u> (MAF) provides statewide information, support, and educational learning opportunities for families who have children and young adults (birth to 26 years of age) who receive (or may be eligible to receive) special education services. MAF provides services to all families, with an emphasis on assisting families/students from underserved populations. The Michigan Alliance for Families is also Michigan's federally funded <u>Parent Training and Information Center</u>.

Each Michigan Alliance staff member is a parent or family member of an individual with disabilities who has first-hand experience with the aspects of the special education system. Every staff member is trained in listening, communicating, and problem-solving.

Families and educators can connect directly to a regional Parent Mentor. Parent Mentors can assist in navigating the educational system and are knowledgeable about state and local resources. Parent Mentors support existing and emerging parent leaders involved with groups such as Local Interagency Coordinating Councils (LICCs), Parent Advisory Committees (PACs), the Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC), and the Michigan Interagency Coordinating Council (MICC).

Special Education Mediation Services*

*Previously Michigan Special Education Mediation Program (MSEMP)

<u>Special Education Mediation Services (SEMS)</u> provides mediation, facilitation, and training services for working through disagreements so that children with disabilities promptly receive the services they need to develop and succeed in school. These services often help to avoid disputes or help resolve them early.

Good communication between parents and the school district is critical in working together to meet the educational needs of students. Facilitators and mediators support collaborative conversations to help build a foundation for student achievement. The value of mediation is recognized by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and the MDE OSE.

Facilitation and mediation services are available free of charge.
